## DA asks: 'Start by Believing' to end sexual violence

District Attorney Matt Ballard is heading up an effort to fight sexual assault with a simple but effective campaign called "Start By Believing".

Ballard said he is asking victims, the public and the media to gather on the Rogers County Courthouse steps at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday, April 6, to kick off the program.

likelihood the victim will seek professional help or report to police plummets, the prosecutor's office said.

It is a terrifying given that, on average, a rapist will attack six people, so every attack that goes unreported could well mean five more rapes and victory for the perpetrator.

Law enforcement, survivors, victim advocates and members of the community will all attend the Courthouse

The DA's office said, "Show your support for victims of sexual assault and take a stand by taking the pledge that if someone tells you he or she has been sexually assaulted START BY BELIEVING."

Start by Believing pledge sheets to sign and show support will be provided.

Ballard says "Making sure all victims receive proper treatment and are encouraged to report is key to a safer and healthier community."
